

ASIA_V 110 Introduction to Religions in Asia

Short Description

This course focuses on major religious traditions that have played an important role in Asia and introduces key aspects of religion: ritual, philosophy, history, hagiography, views of time and the world, as well as typical features of the texts and social structures associated with a given tradition. We will read religious texts and academic works, introducing key ideas and methods in religious studies.

We begin by studying the early religions of China (Yellow River) and South Asia (Indus River). Then, we explore major traditions like Daoism, Confucianism, Hinduism, Jainism, and Buddhism. In the medieval period, we look at the spread of Buddhism in East Asia, shamanism in East and North Asia (including Shintō), and the growth of devotional practices in Sufi Islam, Hinduism, and Sikhism in South Asia. The course ends with a look at modern and indigenous religions, including those of the Ainu and Karen peoples.

Mode of Delivery: Online. All lectures are delivered synchronously using Zoom and Discord (Zoom for audiovisual, Discord for text chat). Zoom recordings will be posted.
