ASIA_V 456 - History and Culture of Taiwan

This course explores major social, economic, political, and cultural changes and continuities in Taiwan from the seventeenth century to the present. The purpose of the course is to provide students with a critical approach to history and a broad knowledge base concerning Taiwanese history and culture. It is also intended to stimulate further interest in studying Taiwan society, particularly the evolution of its democracy, as well as its place in today's global world. After completing this course, students are expected not only to have acquired the knowledge and understanding of the unique historical path from which Taiwan developed into an economically prosperous and a politically democratic society, and how their economic and political developments have encountered difficulties in this age of ever faster changes, but also to have the ability to discuss this knowledge with clarity and accuracy.
