ASIA_V 442 - Lives of Chinese Books

This is research seminar for Asian Studies majors introduces research skills for the humanities. This year we will be focusing on the Book of Changes (Yi jing) and its complex history. The book survives in several different versions, many with multiple layers of explanation by commentators, different accounts of its purpose and origin and divergent interpretations of its contents. It was used for many different purposes: as a manual for divination about the future, as a guide to cosmology, and as a model for literary creation.

We will focus on how to make sense of a text with such a complex existence and how to ask questions about it that can be answered through research. The course requires no knowledge of languages other than English, but sources in Asian languages may be used for research projects.
