ASIA_V 349 - Ecoculture and Literature in Japan

This course offers an ecocultural approach to reading, analyzing, and writing about narratives written in Japan from premodern times to the present. We will read, interpret, discuss, and write about literary texts from the past millennium to better understand how the human and "more-than-human" have been defined and understood.

We will study and apply a range of methodologies and theories, including Indigenous epistemologies, narratology, ecocriticism, critical animal studies, queer environmentalism, and material ecocriticism. Students will have the opportunity to carry out embodied learning activities in Nitobe Memorial Garden. Through exercises involving material culture, observation, and applied tasks, students will gain experience with literary analysis and ecocritical approaches while producing original, scholarly research.
