ASIA_V 354 - Introduction to Japanese Cinema

This is an introductory survey course on the cinema of Japan from the silent era to the present. We will practice the foundations of media literacy, visual analysis, and reception as we trace culturally specific historical, industrial, and aesthetic movements throughout the history of Japan's film industries. As we traverse over a hundred years of cinema in thirteen weeks, remember that while we will be encountering representative films that highlight specific historical developments and trends, no one film can represent the entirety of expression, experimentation, or even commercial popularity of a given moment, locale, or audience. Keep in mind this is an introduction to Japanese cinema; you are only just getting acquainted! To maintain this perspective, we will encounter a variety of genres, directors, and production modes supplementary to the readings and screenings each week during the lecture period. All readings are in English. Most films are in Japanese with English subtitles.
