ASIA_V 383 - Korean History Through Film

In this course, we will explore modern Korean history through a cultural lens. Starting from the colonial period to the present day, each week will explore a milestone moment in Korea's modern history through film, revealing a facet of how film as cultural product engages with contemporary issues or how film has remembered/redeployed past historical moments. The course places emphasis on understanding how cinema's fictional freedom can affect the display of historical events, demonstrating the intersection of 'history' and 'collective memory' in filmic texts. Each week, students will view one film alongside two compulsory readings: one historical overview and one article analysing the film. Examining the link between history and film, students will gain a thorough knowledge of key historical moments that have shaped modern Korea, with attention to formations of gender, class, and national identity as well as an understanding of the ways culture reflects/challenges/distorts history.
